"Homework has a positive impact on average (+ 5 months), particularly with pupils in secondary schools."

The timetable above shows the frequency that homework will be set for your son/daughter based on their Key Stage and what subjects they study. All students have been made aware of their requirement to complete homework on time, and they will be rewarded for this through class charts. Equally, if homework isn't completed then it will also be logged via class charts for you to keep track of. Staff will also be sending out a class charts announcement each week to inform you of what the homework task is, and where it can be found. The school library is open at break, lunch time and after school to provide a safe space for students to complete homework.

I hope that you can support your children at home, as we are at school, by extolling the benefits of completing homework on time and to the best of their ability.

A small toy, a pair of gloves, a chocolate treat, toiletries, a book.


