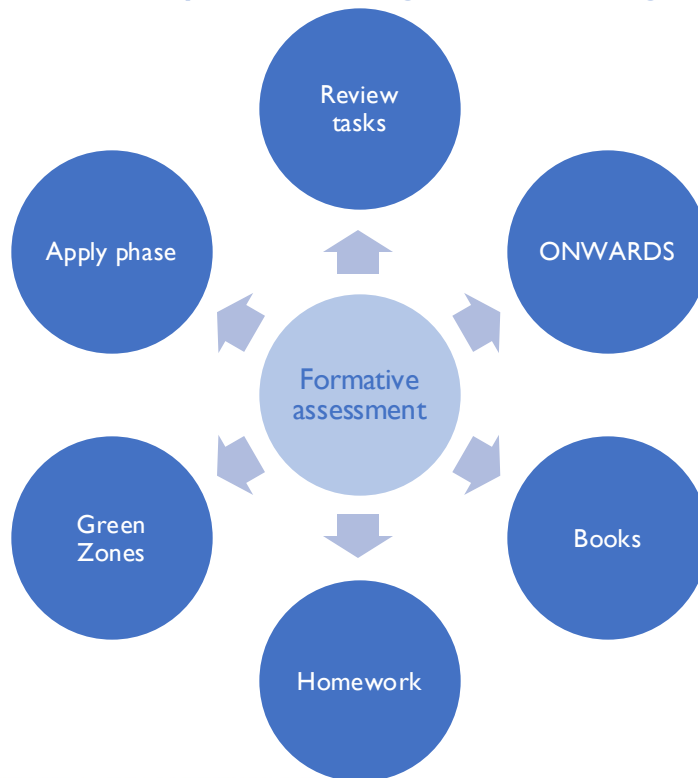
ASSESSMENT and REPORTING

KEY STAGE 4 (GCSE)



Assessment is holistic, when working out whether a student is on, above or below target. Teachers use both formative and summative assessment

Formative assessment improves learning, and we often refer to it as assessment for learning. This takes place during the learning and can take many forms



Formative assessment is integrated and ongoing and lets teachers see what progress a student is making and provides information which assists them to plan how to help pupils make further progress



SUMMATIVE ASSESSMENT

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Cumulative in nature

- Assesses content taught up to that date

GCSE exam papers

- Likely to be exam board sample or past exam papers, (or based on these). They are assessed using assessment objectives, specifications, mark schemes and are reported using GCSE exam grades

Holistic

- Used by teachers to make an overall judgement on where students are in terms of their current knowledge, skills and understanding and a working at grade is reported in relation to prior attainment



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YOUR ASSESSMENT JOURNEY – TARGET GRADES

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- GCSE target grades have been based on information from how students have performed in their subjects in KS3 (Year 10) and KS3/Y10 (Year 11) as due to Covid-19, students in the current Year 10 and 11 **did not sit SATs** in Primary School
- ALL Subject Leaders have completed a **thorough review of target grades** for each individual student in Year 10 and 11 to ensure they are both aspirational and appropriate, based on the level of ability in that subject.
- These target grades were shared at the end of the academic year 2023-2024 and will be shared with all students at the start of September 2024.



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YOUR ASSESSMENT JOURNEY – TARGET GRADES

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- Target grades will be different for different students and for different subjects
- Students need to know their Target Grade so that they know what they are aiming for. Students should be aiming to reach their target by the end of the year, but they might do so before this
- The targets do not limit what students can achieve in their subjects. In other words, if a student is targeted a grade 5, this does not mean they cannot achieve a grade 6 or higher
- In Year 10, a student's target grade will be one grade lower than their target in Year 11. This is to account for progress to be made as knowledge and understanding of the course develops

NOTE - When your child enters the school in Year 7, they are placed on the learning journey at a certain level based on prior attainment. A student's pathway may change throughout their time at Halewood Academy.

Example - Notice how Student D's target grade is **different** in Year 10 compared to Year 11. It has been set **one level lower** than the final GCSE grade. This is because only part of the course will have been studied up to this point and to allow for progress to be made across the 2 years.



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ASSESSMENT JOURNEY - GREEN ZONES

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- You will continue to complete **Green Zones** in all subjects which are like mini assessments. **Remember: Green Zones are important** and you need to try your best and respond to the feedback from teachers to improve your performance. These learning points will be used by your teacher to review your **knowledge / skills / understanding** on a particular topic and help identify where there may be gaps in knowledge that will need to be re-taught / learnt
- **Green Zones** are linked to the GCSE exam specification and past paper questions. These are important as they will give you confidence to tackle this type of question in your mocks and summer exams
- Prior to a **Green Zone** your class teacher will tell you what is being assessed and what knowledge / skills / understanding that you will need to use
- When you have completed a **Green Zone** your teacher will likely use GCSE Mark Schemes / Department Assessment Steps to assess your work



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- In addition to **Green Zones**, your teachers will be assessing your knowledge, skills and understanding all the time through your work in books and how you do in your **review** and **apply** stages of your RAMAR lesson
- Your **responses to questioning** in lessons – this could be in books or verbally
- Your **homework completion** and quality

HOWEVER, the biggest weighting will be on how you perform in your P2S assessments

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YEAR 11 MOCK EXAMS

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- Year 11 will complete 2 rounds of mock exams in December 2024 and March 2025. These will be exam papers based on the content taught to date. They will be held in full exam conditions to replicate the real exams in May and June 2025
- The key to success is for students to treat them like they are the real exams and then they will get a better picture of what they are doing well and what they need to improve on, or revise in more depth
- Students should revise at home and attend any super-curricular opportunities offered by subjects in sessions at breakfast, lunch or after school
- The learning taken from these exams is crucial to understanding how to improve through the rest of the academic year
- Year 11 Mocks (P2S2) Monday 2nd December 2024 – Friday 20th December 2024 (Practical exams differ)
- Year 11 Mocks (P2S3) Monday 17th March 2025 – Friday 28th March 2025

Final GCSE exams begin on Week Beginning Monday 5th May 2025



REPORTS

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- At **two points** in the school calendar we will send a report home
- Each subject teacher will **review** all work from your P2S exams, Green Zones, Classwork and Homework to determine what Grade they will report home. This will be a best fit but the largest weighting will be on exam paper performance
- Even though you may have scored well on a section of a GCSE paper or an exam style question, your class teacher will have to consider these pieces of work in relation to the whole GCSE course. The more of the course you complete, the harder you work, the more your class teachers can examine
- Your class teacher will also choose a **comment to describe your progress**. To make this judgement, your class teacher will look at all your work and see how it **compares to your potential**
- If your work is better than your potential, then your progress comment will reflect this
- If your class teacher believes that you should be performing better than you are doing in your assessments, then your progress comment will reflect this
- Your class teacher will also report information about your **behaviour** in lessons
- Your report will also give an overview of **Behaviour Points, RACER Points, Attendance and Punctuality**

REPORT KEY

1. End of Year Target:

In Year 10 students will be given a target grade, they are placed on a particular level based on prior attainment

2. Current Progress:

This is a grade the student is working at in each subject. This ranges through grades 9-1, or for practical subjects is based on the Pass, Merit or Distinction grading system

3. Progress Comment:

The comment reflects the learning that has been completed and expectations of where a student should be at this point in the year depending on the level a student is working at

4. Behaviour:

Students are given a score (1, 2 or 3) for their behaviour in lessons. Criteria: 1 = Expected, 2 = Unsatisfactory, 3 = Cause for Concern

5. Attitude to Learning:

Students are given a score (1, 2 or 3) for their attitude to learning in lessons. Criteria: 1 = Exceptional, 2 = Expected, 3 = Requires improvement

6. Attitude to Home Learning:

Students are given a score (1, 2 or 3) for their attitude to home learning. Criteria: 1 = Positive, 2 = Requires improvement, 3 = Cause for concern

7. Achievement Points / Behaviour Concerns:

Achievement Points are the number of reward points a student has achieved since the start of the academic year.

Behaviour Concerns are a total of points accrued for any instances of poor behaviour.

8. Attendance

The attendance figure achieved since the start of the academic year is reflected in the comment, which is based on the fact the school target is 96% and above.
