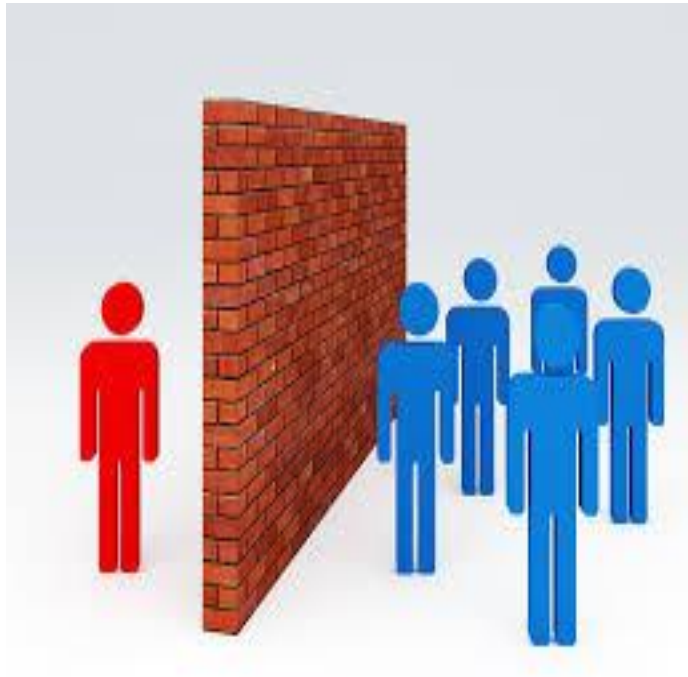
How?

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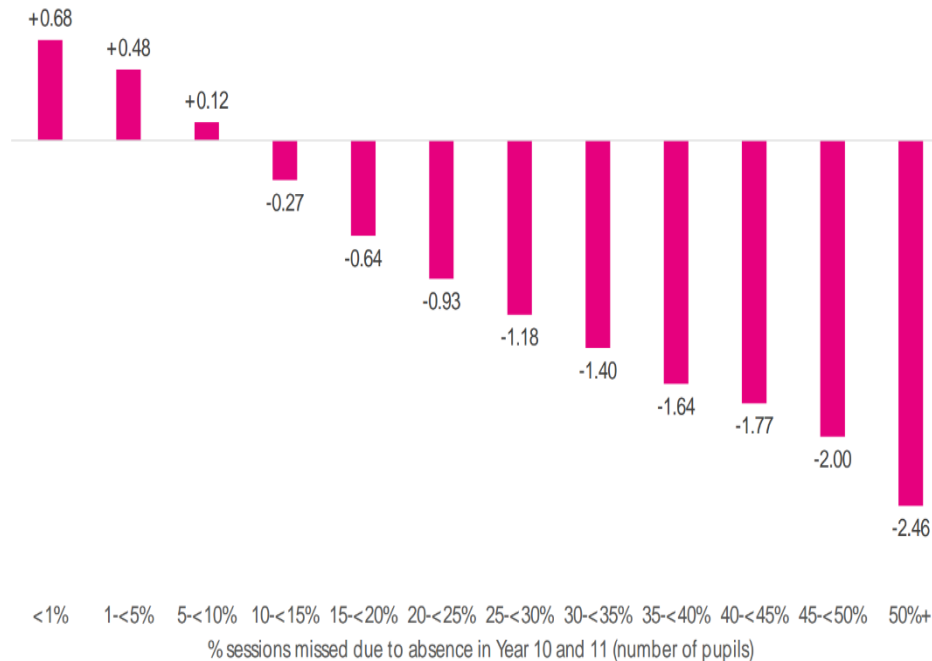

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Core Subjects

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English Language – 1 GCSE
English Literature – 1 GCSE
Maths – 1 GCSE
Science (Separates 3 GCSE, Combined 2 GCSEs)

With these subjects alone, you could have 5 or 6 good GCSEs and this will significantly increase your chances on getting on course of choice at college of choice

For Maths and English, resitting is compulsory if you haven't achieved a pass (grade 4). You'll need to continue studying these subjects until you either pass or turn 18. If you achieved a pass in Maths and English, there's no requirement to resit, but you can if you'd like a higher mark.

Myth Busting

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- English Literature allows students to think critically and analyse complex ideas.
- It is a completely separate GCSE from English Language, therefore students gain two GCSEs from English.
- English Literature exam content is studied in class, therefore students know that they will be asked questions about their Shakespeare texts, their Anthology poems, A Christmas Carol, Blood Brothers and Unseen Poetry. All of these topics can be and should be revised at home on a regular basis.
- Key revision pointers are to have a really good knowledge of the texts in terms of plot, characters and quotations. Students are given revision ideas and information regularly in class. The English department will disseminate some revision materials this evening.
- Knowledge organisers have been given to students with key information on about each section of the exam. Students also have a knowledge organiser about how to construct paragraphs for the Literature essays they should produce in the exams. Again, all knowledge organisers can be used for revision purposes.
- It is important that students show resilience in their English Literature exams. They are 2 hours and 2.5 hours respectively; this is a long time to write for and we practise writing for extended periods of time in lessons.

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Every student has been given a knowledge organiser and these are to be used at home as well as in lessons,

The Knowledge Organiser is a revision tool to support with learning. It contains information for every section of the course, broken down and set out clearly.

Tip 1

Question your child on the content. E.g. Ask them to define the keywords for a topic or to draw a diagram from memory. Give them prompts if they don't get it write, but don't just tell them the answer. Get them to note down any areas they need to work on.



Tip 2

Make it a routine. A few questions a day can make a huge difference – perhaps it could become part of their after breakfast or dinner routine.



Tip 3

Ask your child to teach you about something on the knowledge organiser. Teaching someone else, and answering questions about a topic, is a great way to reinforce knowledge and identify areas of weakness.



Tip 4

Prompt your child to turn the information into a different format. E.g. **Keywords** can become flashcards, facts can be transformed into a mind map.
