#### **Benefits of Good Attendance**

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




#### What can parents/carers do to ensure good attendance?

Ensure your child attends every day, on time, equipped and ready to learn

Ensure school has up to date addresses and telephone numbers



Contact the school each day of absence until your child returns to school

<sup>7</sup> If contact is not made for an absence, it is recorded as unauthorised. The school is responsible for deciding if the absence is acceptable or not

Provide medical evidence for any absence exceeding 5 days (10) sessions) or more

Ensure medical appointments are made outside of school time. If this is not possible, your child needs to be in school prior to and after the appointment. We will need medical evidence upon their return

Holiday requests during term time will not be authorised. Parents who take their children out of school for a holiday may be issued with an **Education Penalty Notice** 



Contact school if you are experiencing difficulty in getting your child into school

Work with the school and any other agencies to resolve any difficulties which may affect regular school attendance

I would ask that parents/carers support their child's education by ensuring regular school attendance and if there are any barrier to this please contact a member of the team so that we can work together to overcome any difficulties.

### **PREFIX OR SUFFIX OF THE WEEK**

# PURPOSE- Why are we doing 'Prefix' or 'Suffix of the week'?

A prefix is a word, letter or number placed at the stem of a word. A suffix is an affix which is placed after the stem of a word.

Both of the above are used to modify the meaning of a word. If you can recognise the most common prefixes and suffixes and what they mean, this will allow you to unlock a wealth of new vocabulary. It's about recognising common patterns to help you to problem solve when seeking meaning.

There are some exceptions when it comes to the meaning of certain prefixes and suffixes so you have to look at the word within the context of the rest of the sentence.

### 12 Top Tips for BUILDING CYBER RESILIENCE AT HOME

As a society, we're increasingly using technology and tech services in the home. Digital assistants which can adjust the heating or turn lights on and off; streaming services for shows and movies on demand; games consoles; smart speakers; phones; laptops ... the list goes on. As we introduce each new gizmo to our homes, however, we increase the level of threat from cyber criminals. It's essential, therefore, that we learn to become more cyber resilient in relation to the devices and digital services that the people in our household use.



#### WHAT IS 'CYBER RESILIENCE?'

Cyber resilience focuses on three key areas: reducing the **likelihood** of a cyber attack gaining access to our accounts, devices or data; reducing the potential **impact** of a cyber incident; and making the **recovery** from a cyber attack easier, should we ever fall victim to one.

#### 1. PASSWORDS: LONGER AND LESS PREDICTABLE

The longer, less common and predictable a password is, the more difficult it becomes for cyber criminals to crack. The National Cyber Security Centre's 'three random words' guidelines are ideal for creating a long password which is easy to remember but hard to guess.

### 2. AVOID RE-USING PASSWORDS

When you use the same password across different logins, your cyber resilience is only as strong as the security of the weakest site or service you've signed up for. If cyber criminals gain access your username and password for one site or service, they'll definitely try them on others.

## 3. USE A PASSWORD

A good way to juggle different passwords for every site or service you use is to have a password manager. This software stores all your passwords for you, so you simply need to remember the master password. LastPass, Dashlane, IPassword and Keeper are all excellent password managers.

#### 4. BACK UP YOUR DATA

Keep a copy of your data using OneDrive, Google Drive or another reputable cloud-based storage solution. If it's extremely important or sensitive information, you could even decide to keep more than one back-up version – by saving it to a removable USB drive or similar device, for example.

#### 5. ENABLE MULTI-FACTOR AUTHENTICATION (MFA)

Multi-factor authentication is where you need access to your phone (to receive a code, for example) or another source to confirm your identity. This makes it far more difficult for cyber criminals to gain entry to your accounts and your data, even if they do manage to get your username and password.

#### 6. CHOOSE RECOVERY QUESTIONS WISELY

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Some services let you set 'recovery questions' – such as your birthplace or a pet's name – in case you forget your password. Take care not to use information you might have mentioned (or are likely to in future) on social media More unpredictable answers make cyber criminals' task far harder.

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#### 7. SET UP SECONDARY ACCOUNTS

Some services provide the facility to add secondary accounts, phone numbers and so on to help with potentially recovering your account. Make sure you set these up they will be vital if you're having trouble logging in or if you're trying to take back control of your account after a cyber attack.

### 12. STAY SCEPTICAL

Cyber criminals commonly use various methods, including emails, text messages and social media posts. Be cautious of any messages or posts that are out of the ordinary, offer something too good to be true or emphasise urgency – even if they appear to come from someone you

#### 11. KEEP HOME DEVICES UPDATED

Download official software updates for your household's mobile phones laptops, consoles and other internet-enabled devices regularly. Security improvements and fixes ar a key feature of these updates – so by ensuring each device is running the latest version, you're making them more secure.

### 10. CHANGE DEFAULT

Devices from the 'Internet of Things' (IoT), such as 'smart' home appliances, are often supplied with default passwords. This makes them quicker to set up, but also less secure – criminals can identify these standard passwords more easily, so change them on your IoT devices as soon as possible.

#### 9. CHECK FOR BREACHES

You can check if your personal information has been involved in any known data breaches by entering your email address at www.haveibeenpwned.com (yes, that spelling is correct!). It's useful fyou're worried about a possible attack – or simply as motivation to review your account security.

#### 8. KEEP HAVING FUN WITH TECH





## JCO A quick guide for students

#### What is AI?

• Al stands for artificial intelligence and using it is like having a computer that thinks

Al tools like ChatGPT or Snapchat My Al can write text, make art and create music by learning from data from the internet, but watch out – they can also make things up and be biased How can AI be misused in assessments?

Al misuse is when you take something made using Al and say it's your own work.

### THIS IS CHEATING!

#### How do I make sure I don't misuse AI?

#### 🕟 Know the rules

- You're **not allowed** to use Al tools when you're in an exam
- Your teachers will tell you if you're allowed to use AI tools when doing your coursework – the rules will depend on your qualification
- Even if you're allowed to use Al tools, you can't get marks for content just produced by Al – your marks come from showing your own understanding and producing your own work
- Reference reference reference! If you're allowed to use Al tools, you must reference them clearly
- Name the AI tool you used
- Add the date you generated the content
- Explain how you used it
- Save a screenshot of the questions you asked and the answers you got

**Declare it's all your own work** – When you hand in your assessment, you have to sign a declaration. Anything without a reference must be all your own work. If you've used an Al tool, don't sign the declaration until you're sure you've added all the references

What happens if I misuse AI?

If you've misused AI, you could lose your marks for the assessment – you could even be disqualified from the subject.
